There were 69 members present for the 69th Provincial Conference held at the Nottawasaga Inn Resort in Alliston, Ontario with twenty-eight voting delegates on Saturday and twenty-five on Sunday. Our Club Alternate, Carrie Andrews and Delegate Nancy Barnes were well supported by six other club members in attendance: Judy Hagerman, Barbara Hicks, Sheila Crook, Mavis Carlton, Roxy Barnes and Sandy Johnston. Following feedback from some other clubs, we decided to withdraw our resolution on expanding midwifery for improvement of well-women care. We anticipate revising this resolution.

Results of the 2015 Resolutions

- Resolution 2015–01: Provincial Action on Missing and Murdered Aboriginal Women submitted by: Trenton & District Club and BPW Belleville Club Carried
- Resolution 2015–02: Pay Equity for Midwives of Ontario submitted by BPW Bowmanville Club
 Defeated despite a number of friendly amendments for clarification
- Resolution 2015–03: Withdrawn.
- Resolution 2015–04: Provincial Action of Prevention of Sexual Harassment Submitted by BPW North Toronto –Carried unanimously with friendly amendments

- We realized how specific a resolution must be to be approved. At conference, many members from other clubs volunteered to assist us with the revisions for our resolutions.

Global Community Champion for Women's Economic Empowerment

What do you call a selfie that also helps empower women and fight poverty?

A #strengthie.

The Malala Fund tweeted a strengthie of Malala
Yousafzai and said: "Malala is standing
#withstronggirls & @ONEcampaign by posting her
#strengthie for girls' education. Will you join us?"

The advocacy group ONE's #PovertyIsSexist social media campaign aims to end extreme poverty across the world, and particularly in Africa, by showing girls' strength and getting the world to stand with strong girls. ONE's website says,"No matter how you cut it — socially, economically, legally — girls and women in the poorest countries get a raw deal."

A <u>2012 World Bank report on gender equality</u> states that 31 million girls worldwide aren't in school, 4 million women go "missing" each year, and there's an average wage gap of 20 percent between men and women (along with gaps in work opportunities). Strengthies are a part of <u>ONE's petition for world leaders</u> to commit to ending extreme poverty by empowering girls. Along with the signed petition, the organization plans to show strengthies from across the globe to politicians and leaders making crucial decisions about women in the world's poorest countries.

The petition reads:

Dear World Leaders,

This year we can commit to ending extreme poverty - but we will only achieve this if we unlock the full potential of millions of girls and women. I'm counting on you to take real action that leads to real change - prioritising the countries and people that need it the most.

The campaign's song, "Strong Girl," embodies ONE's mission.

Performed by nine female musicians from seven African countries, the song's mantra is "Be strong, girl, the time has come to take our place as strong ladies." While other anti-poverty campaigns have tried to represent Africa from afar, this one is utilizing well-known and talented women from the all over the continent to speak for their home countries and empower girls who idolize them.
